The County of Mendocino has secured grant funding to support removal of dead or dying hazardous trees on private property within the 2017 Redwood Complex Fire Footprint, as part of the *Redwood Complex Fire: Hazardous Tree Removal Project*. **You are receiving this mailer because County records indicate you are the owner of a property located in the fire footprint.** The goal of this project is to abate hazards related to the dead and dying trees caused by the fire, which pose a hazard to health, safety, and private property. The Mendocino County Resource Conservation District (MCRCD), in partnership with the Mendocino County Fire Safe Council (MCFSC), is administering the project.

Trees eligible for removal must meet the following requirements, to be verified by a Registered Professional Forester:

1. be assessed as dead or dying,
2. be at least 10 inches in diameter and 20 feet tall, and
3. structurally threaten a permanent residence or building pad.

If you are interested in participating in the project, please fill in the information below, complete the plot plan (hand drawing) requested on the opposite side of this page, sign the enclosed access agreement, and return the materials in the enclosed postage-paid envelope. You will be contacted by a MCFSC representative to verify your eligibility and schedule a site visit to assess the trees you identify for removal. **Please note that there are limited resources available for this project and they will be allocated on a first-come, first-served basis, so please reply promptly if you wish to participate.**


